

ACTION STEPS – NATIONAL REFERENDUM 14th OCTOBER 2023

Voting Day

1. **Attend an AUSTRALIAN ELECTORAL COMMISSION – Polling Station, Saturday, 14th October 2023**
2. Ask to speak to the Polling Booth Manager to request to view the Original Referendum Writ, signed and Issued by the Governor-General, Sir David Hurley, according to section 7 & 8, * FORM A, at Schedule 1, the '**REFERENDUM (MACHINERY PROVISIONS) ACT**', 1984 (*see pages 2-5*)
3. In the likely event that the Polling Station Manager cannot provide you the Constitutional copy of the REFERENDUM WRIT, you MUST demand that the Manager take your Name & Address, to report back to the AEC, that you attended the Polling Station on the day.
4. You MUST ask for the names of the Polling Station Manager & any other people that you speak to on the day, for your record and notes on the day. You must inform the Manager that –

Don FARRELL (Natural Person) has '**DISQUALIFIED MY VOTE**', & you require this to be recorded.
5. It is suggested that you attend these places with Witnesses, to share your experiences.
6. At the Polling Station, or as soon as can, you MUST take notes and record everything that happened. Names, Times & what happened etc.

Your Next Steps

After you have left the polling booth, please take the following steps and instructions.

7. We have created a '**DISQUALIFICATION NOTICE**' template for anyone who requests a copy of the Constitutional Writ and it is available on the Empower The East website <https://empowertheeast.com.au/> under the heading "GOVERNANCE. The form is created as a Word Document and you simply follow the instructions.

Part II—Writ for a referendum

7 Writ for a referendum

Whenever a proposed law for the alteration of the Constitution is to be submitted to the electors, the Governor-General may issue a writ for the submission of the proposed law to the electors.

8 Form of writ

(1) A writ issued under section 7 may be in accordance with Form A in Schedule 1, shall be signed by the Governor-General and shall appoint:

- (a) the day for the close of the Rolls;
- (b) the day, being a Saturday, for taking the votes of electors; and
- (c) the day for the return of the writ.

(1A) The date fixed for the return of the writ must not be more than 100 days after the issue of the writ.

(2) The Governor-General shall cause to be attached to the writ a copy of the proposed law, or a copy of a statement setting out:

- (a) the text of the proposed law; and
- (b) the text of the particular provisions (if any) of the Constitution proposed to be textually altered by the proposed law, and the textual alterations proposed to be made therein.

(3) For the purposes of this Act, a writ shall be deemed to have been issued at 6 o'clock in the afternoon of the day on which the writ was issued.

2 Governor-General to deal with writ

The Governor-General shall, immediately after the issue of a writ for a referendum:

(a) cause a copy of the writ and a copy of the proposed law or of the statement (if any) attached to the writ to be forwarded to the Governors of the several States, to the Chief Minister for the Australian Capital Territory and to the Administrator of the Northern Territory; and

(b) forward the original writ and a copy of the proposed law or of the statement (if any) attached to the writ to the Electoral Commissioner.

The following is the form that must be filled out and by law, a copy must be at every polling booth, or evidence that it was placed in newspapers.

2. For taking the votes of the electors: the day of 20 .
3. For the return of the writ: the day of 20 .
